Overview, Other Resources & Printing



This is an overview of the contents of stories 11-20.

1. The stories are available separately in PowerPoint format. Included: Stories only in animated power point format showing pictures and texts. 240 slides over 10 stories.
2. And / Or as a PDF, complete with teaching kit as follows:

Each story comes as an individual PDF document with:

- Table of contents
- Story texts in two versions – a basic version for complete beginners and a version with more vocabulary for children who have been learning English for a year or two.
- Lesson plan ideas for the story consisting of pre-story ideas, ideas to use during story-telling and post-story activities
- Pre-story games to introduce the key vocabulary and phrases
- Ideas to use during story telling
- Post-story activities
- A4 colour illustrations
- Bingo set
- The basic story text in large font to stick on the back of the relevant story illustrations and in some cases there is extra colouring, in addition to the black and white vocabulary flashcards
- Colour vocabulary flashcards are provided for all ten stories in two sizes.

You'll find the preschool games book included with stories 1 to 10 helpful for use with the lesson plans, but not obligatory.

Revision: very, hear, love

Nouns: bedroom, bathroom, stairs, hall, living room, kitchen

Cowboys and Indians, chocolate cake

Verbs: fighting

Other: dark, light, thank you

Who is in there? What is in there?

Revision: bedroom, bathroom, stairs, hall, mother, father, sister, brother, grandfather, grandmother, dog

Revision: To give, love, play, hears...calling

Revision: Here is, thank you

Days of the Week: Revised from story 10, or leave out

New Nouns: dining room, train, track, present

Extra vocabulary in version 2

To love, to play, to carry, to call, to go, to go bang

Gigantic, thing, house, fire cracker, shampoo (revision from version 2 story 12), toys, school books, front door, food, dinner table

Late, darling, time for bed, how nice, sleepy, suddenly, wide awake

15. We Build Our House

Revision: Family: father, mother, sister, and the cat

Revision Nouns: kitchen, living room, bathroom, bedroom, house, Revision from stories 1 to 10: green, field, garden, flowers, green grass

Revision: Hello, run, play, quick, thank you

New Nouns: beach, sea, desert, sand, mountain, snow

New Verbs: build

New Other: lovely

Extra vocabulary in version 2

Wash, cook, clean, look after, play with, play, to be mad about, shout, run, climb, ski

New Optional: first, second, third, fourth, fifth. If you prefer, replace with 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5

New Other: How many ... are there? There is, there are.

Extra vocabulary in version 2

Visit, wake up, come, let's go, hide and live

Cockerel, gate, night, day, burrow, farmhouse

Fast asleep, quietly, next, out and about, together

17. Thomas

Revision: path, mother, grass, pond

Revision Verbs: play, walk, run

Revision Other: Thank you, you can't catch me, bye bye

New Nouns: computer, bandage, mummy, lamppost, hole, friends

New Body parts: head, nose, arm, leg, foot

New Verbs: fall, put on

New Other: Ouch! That is better.

Extra vocabulary in version 2

See, talk, reply, stop, eat, trip over, fall over, fall into, fall down,

Revision Other: Let's play, run, you can't catch me, ouch, that is better, put on, bedroom,
bandage, how many
New Nouns: tail, eye, mouth
New Verbs: steps on
New Phrases: I would like

Extra vocabulary in version 2

Friends, hide and seek, drawer, something, game
Hide, find, bet, chase, get off, think, put on, join in, sneeze, talk, tidy, put away
Bigger, faster, tiny, quick, hard, terrible, luckily, all right, fun, sweet
All the time

19. Dressing Up

Revision Nouns: mother, father, bedroom,
Revision Verbs:
Put on, play, hear coming, quick, hide, see, comes in and goes out
Also: Possessives
New Clothes: shoes, trousers, dress, shirt, hat
New Verbs: laugh
New Phrases: How do you do? That was fun.

Extra vocabulary in version 2

Queen of England, voice, sleeves, pudding, tonight
Allow, know
Fancy, evening, gigantic, huge, far too long, posh and furious
Thank goodness, grown up

20. The Princess and the Pirate

Revision: cat, mouse, shirt, dress, trousers, shoes, hat
Revision other: I would like, thank you, how do you do
New Nouns: princess, pirate, fairy, wand, skirt, boots
New Other: What would you like? To wave

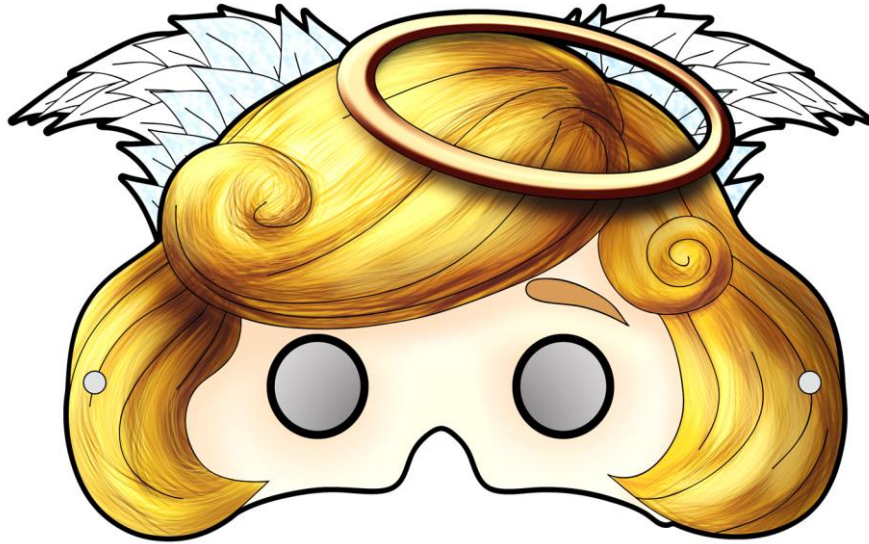
Extra vocabulary in version 2

lovely, pirate-like, princess-like, treasure hunt, seven seas

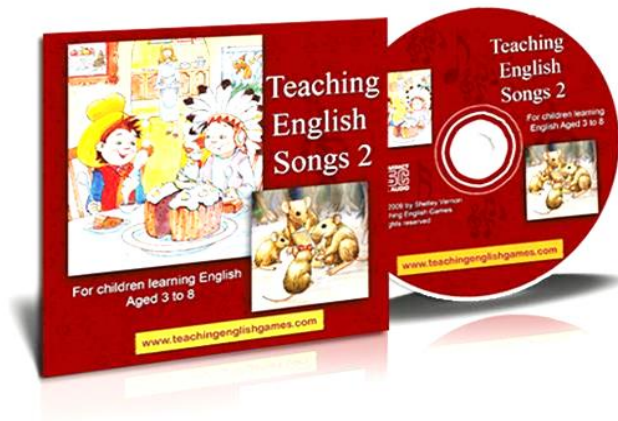

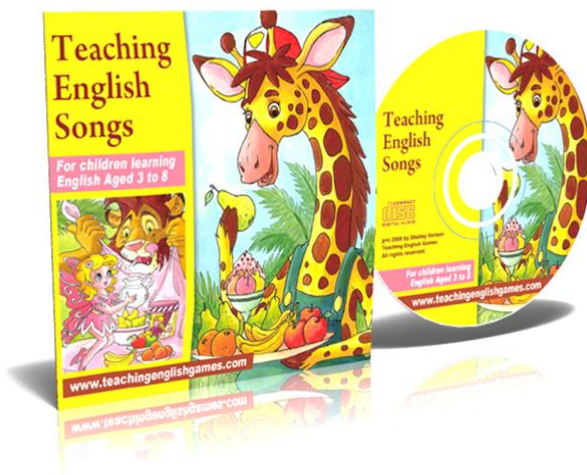

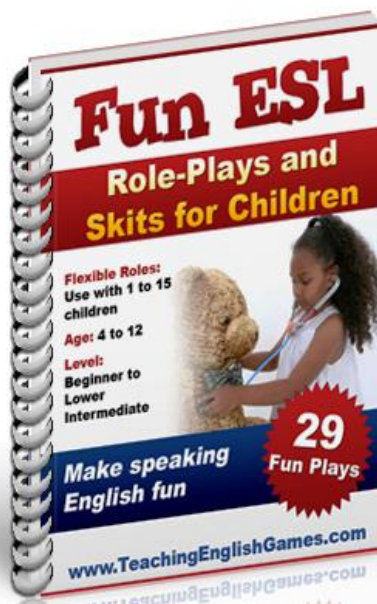

Printing and Copyright

This book is designed to be easy to use onscreen via the links from the table of contents and the detailed index.

Should you choose to print it, it is written in an ecological font with tiny holes in it to save ink.

PRINTING TIPS

To use much less ink and print everything quicker print in colour but always selecting draft or economy ink setting.

To find that option:

1. Open the document you want to print
2. Select FILE then PRINT and your printer menu will open.
3. Look for SETTINGS or PREFERENCES and select draft or economy.

The wording may vary depending on your printer, but this option will be there.

SPECIAL FONT

This is an optional step to save more ink every time you print any document.

The books are created with an ink-saving font with tiny holes. You save 20% more ink in addition to saving ink using the draft printer setting.

To benefit from this font you need to install it in your fonts folder. If you are a total beginner with computers you might prefer to skip this step.

When you yourself create documents you may use this font and save ink each time you print.

It's best to print in sections, such as ten pages at a time; that way if your printer chews up a page you won't be in a total mess!

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
